Lou Anders, author of the Thrones and Bones series, was a keynote speaker at Pioneer Con. The talented author was the perfect match for this science fiction lover's event. His current series of books is enthralling middle schoolers with fast paced action, fantasy, and hordes of monsters. Some of Anders' earlier work includes Time Unincorporated 2: The Doctor Who Fanzine Archives and The Making of Star Trek First Contact. Anders has also worked as editor of Bookface, a free online book service. He also has worked as a journalist writing over 500 articles for numerous magazines and publications. His current series includes a lush fantasy landscape of trolls, dragons, and young heroes and heroines. The series includes three books: Frostborn, Skyborn, and Nightborn.

Mr. Anders has received numerous awards including a Chesley Award for best art director and a Hugo Award. His website lists video games and travel as his favorite hobbies. As one of his dislikes he states, "I am afraid of oatmeal." Mr. Anders moved back to Birmingham in 2003 from San Francisco. He started his career in writing with plays, script-writing and then journalism. He currently has a website: Thronesandbones.com and a blog. Anders also has a very busy public speaking tour. He resides in Birmingham with his family and a pet fish named Blue.

In today's day and age, YouTube sensations arise from hard work and dedication to their dreams, and one of Pioneer Con's featured guests has found his calling in his web series, *Trekspertise*. Kyle Sullivan hit the ground running with his series, collecting over 1.7 million views in the past two years, with a staggering 38,000+ subscribers. Sullivan notes, "Trekspertise discusses the form, function and intricacies of science fiction" with a detailed focus on the Star Trek franchise. Topics range from analyzing an episode of *Star Trek* to discussing the behind-the-scenes work of the entire series. While *Star Trek* is the primary focus of *Trekspertise*, Sullivan tries not to limit the episodes just to Star *Trek*, but to expand to science fiction as a whole. *Trekspertise* has won awards from the Miami International Science Fiction Film Festival. Overall in his presentation, Sullivan broke down the meaning of *Trekspertise*, the behind the scenes work and what you can do as fans to reach out!

Hubbard: How did you get into sci-fi?

Goss: My parents owned a used bookstore, and they'd let me get "first pick" always. I brought home The Lord of the Rings trilogy, a collection of Lester Del Rey's short stories, and a smattering of Frank Herbert and have been hooked ever since. It's probably why I'm a librarian.

H: Favorite sci-fi authors and why?

G: To clarify, I am more a reader of fantasy than science fiction, but I do love sci-fi as well. Some of my favorites are Frank Herbert, William Gibson, Iain M. Banks, and Ray Bradbury. This is the short list. There's not enough room here otherwise. These guys are great at storytelling and providing different perspectives on just about everything ... from race relations to economics to war ... consciousness, artificial intelligence, and what it means to be "human" ...the list goes on.

H: What are you reading and thoughts about it?

G: Right now, I am re-reading [for the umpteenth time] Tad Williams' *The Dragonbone Chair* [book one of the series Memory, Sorrow, and Thorn] ... I did purchase Iain M. Banks' last novel, but I can't bring myself to read it. He is dead now [died in 2013], and in my mind, I will always have a "new" book by this genius.

H: What do you think of the idea of Pioneer Con?

G: Anything that helps students feel involved in the life of the college is awesome. Anything that gets a variety of students and faculty together is good for the students and the faculty.

H: Any ideas for next year?

G: Maybe the next iteration of Pioneer Con can be on FANTASY.

An Ireland Divided

Dr. Catherine O'Rourke, a visiting Fulbright Scholar from Ireland, presented to a history class at Jeff State's Clanton campus on November 15, 2016. Dr. O'Rourke specializes in cultural and gender studies at Ulster University. Students, faculty, and staff attended this class and learned an overview of the civil rights struggles between Ireland and the Republic of Northern Ireland. Northern Ireland is predominantly Protestant while the remainder of Ireland is predominantly Catholic. Dr. O'Rourke discussed the civil unrest and incivility shown to the few Catholics in this northern area. She brought her lecture to a close looking at the landscape of the

civil rights issues today. Ireland is still much divided, but broadening from the original religious civil rights issue, today much division is based on other human rights: laws governing people with disabilities, children, various ethnicities, sexual orientation, and women's reproductive rights.
